## FDOT to Host March 25 Hybrid Public Hearing for Proposed Changes to Timuquana Road

**JACKSONVILLE, Fla.**- The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) is scheduled to host a hybrid public hearing Thursday, March 25 from 4 to 6 p.m. to discuss proposed changes to Timuquana Road (State Road 134).

As part of a planned resurfacing project on Timuquana Road from east of Blanding Boulevard (State Road 21) to U.S. 17, FDOT proposes closing the median opening at Water Oak Lane. The project will also include installing new pavement markings and signs, including the addition of a buffered bicycle lane in both directions, as well as drainage improvements and curb and sidewalk repairs.

FDOT staff and consultants will be available from 4 to 6 p.m. to answer questions and accept comments. A formal hearing and public comment period will begin at 6 p.m.

Citizens who are unable to participate virtually may attend the hearing in person at the FDOT Urban Office Training Center located at 2198 Edison Avenue, Jacksonville, FL 32204. Both virtual and in-person participants will be given equal opportunity to ask questions and make oral statements that will become part of the public hearing record.
